Another year draws to a close, and it's been a good one. 2019 marked the 50th anniversary of the Bradford Landmark Society and we had all sorts of special "doings" during the year. Here are some of the events that marked the celebration:

A musical jam session and workshop called "January Thaw" was held at the Crook Farm, January 11.

The Landmark Society gave Valentines to McKean County nursing home residents, in appreciation for being part of our history.

A spoof, announcing the Crook Farm as the site of an upcoming Woodstock revival concert, was announced on April Fools Day.

A Historic Trivia Contest ran in the Bradford Era, and Old Time Movies about Bradford at the Main Street Movie House were shown with free admission on April 24th. The Landmark was awarded the Chamber of Commerce Legacy Award on April 25.

Crook Farm School Program began May 17th and at the end of May, the Landmark Society had a float in the Memorial Day parade.

The Patriotic and Popular Music Program at the Crook Farm was held July 7 with hot dogs, Tubbers and ice cream sold; the sixth annual Best of the Creative Women Workshop was held July 27. Meanwhile, on July 6, Sally Costik represented the Landmark with a display at the History Day event at the Kinzua Bridge.

The 40th annual Old Time Music and Crook Farm Country fair held was celebrated August 24 & 25. "Landmark Legends" House and Building Tour was held September 28 with 200 participants.

A Seminar Lecture Series was held three consecutive November evenings at the Bradford Public Library, featuring the Bent Brass Band; Behind the Music: Marilyn Horne; Football between St. Bernard and Bradford High School, and Bradford in the Cold War as topics.

CHRONOLOGY OF THE BUSINESSES AND BUILDINGS, 2019

Each year, we try to list the businesses and buildings that have moved, closed, opened, or changed names or owners. We don't catch them all, but do our best to keep track during the year,

NEW

Ace Hardware and Lumber, 200 West Washington Street (the old Parkview store), opened October 22nd.

Bradford Chocolate Factory, at 72 Main Street, a confectionary and candy business, opened November 1st.

Brick Oven Pizza and Catering, a mobile, wood fired, brick oven food truck which sets up at various locations, opened in April.

Cummins Country Charm, a home décor shop and craft workshops, opened August 3rd at 24 Main Street.

Dunkin' Donuts, donut and coffee shop, opened at 9 Chautauqua Place on June 25th.

Flavor Café, at 393 East Main Street, a vape store, opened in November 2019.

Make and Bake at 58 W Washington Street, beside Bradford Auto, opened September 17th. Offering precooked or microwavable healthy meals for take-out.

Blue Angel Spiritual Center & Emporium, 15-17 Kennedy Street. A combination massage center, spiritual consultation, positive energy, and art center, this unique business opened in August 2019.

Bradford Brew Station opened March 13th at 104 Chestnut Street, a mini-brewery and restaurant.

Herbology Bradford, a medical marijuana dispensary, opened May 13th. It is located at 109 Main Street.

CLOSED

Chestnut Street Laundromat, 12 Chestnut Street, opened in October 2018, but was badly damaged by fire in April, 2019. To date, it has not reopened.

Dairy Queen, 119 West Washington Street. Although the electronic sign outside the business promised that it would reopen last spring, it never did. The building and business is now for sale.

Leen's American Asian Diner, 36 Foster Brook, opened May 2018, closed this past summer.

Pig Island Brewery. Plans to open a brewery at 96-98 Main Street this past spring were put on hold following the death of Sean Fraiser, owner, on July 3, 2019.

Sunset Bay Tanning Salon, located at 22 Main Street, destroyed by fire in April 2019. Building has been razed.

MOVED

Evan's Rollerdrome Famous Texas Hots, formerly at 58 W Washington Street beside Bradford Auto moved to 36 Foster Brook Blvd. (on the road to Walmart) in October, now called **Evan's Texas Grill.**

Irwin Medical Associates (Dr. Glenn Irwin) moved to 30 Main Street, Lewis Run. Effective in July.

Label Shopper, formerly further down the Bradford Mall building, remodeled and moved the store; now located beside Tractor Supply. Move was effective August 23.

McKean Insurance, moved to 10 Derrick Road, Suite B, on July 1st.


Interstate Studio, 32 Main Street - In December, moved from their location on Mechanic Street.

The Yankee Doodler

Next year will be the 75th anniversary of the end of World War II, and to mark that historic occasion, the Landmark Society plans to publish a very special book called "The Yankee Doodler." It should be released by August 14, VJ Day, in tribute to the end of the war in 1945.

We didn't make up that title - it has historic precedence in Bradford's history. During World War II, every Thursday, from August 1942 till August 1945, the Bradford Era published a special page in the Era and called it "The Yankee Doodler." It was suggested that the person at home tear out that page and send it to their soldier or sailor family member overseas, so that they could stay informed on the news of the city and McKean County as well as others fighting in the war. By the end of the war, there were 159 Yankee Doodler pages published in the Era.

Each page was filled with news of local men and women who were fighting overseas, enlistments, promotions, a synopsis of the past week's local news, photographs, overseas locations of servicemen and women, transfers, leaves, those in training, short excerpts of letters written home, reports of those captured and in prison camp, weddings and engagements, a short column titled "Our Women in Service", and a transcript of a letter written by 'Joe and the Gang at Dressers' which gave the highlights of what Dresser Industry was doing in Bradford. At the peak of the war, Dressers had 900 men in the war.

Its fascinating reading and we are already at work enlisting the help of several volunteer typists as each week's 'Doodler" is transcribed into today's computer database. It should be a great book.
